


AB Women

Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the desert and streams in the wasteland. Isaiah 43:18-19





Dr. Richard Mouw, Professor of Christian Philosophy at Fuller Theological Seminary and a leading authority in the area of Convicted Civility. Here is an excerpt from his book <u>Uncommon Decency: Christian Civility in an Uncivil World</u>:


"This is what civility comes to, finally: an openness to God's surprises. When that openness marks our lives, we have learned patience-along with the flexibility and tentativeness and humility and awe and modesty that will inevitably come to the patient heart. And since none of this is possible without a clear

sense of who we are, and to whom we belong, the patient heart will also be a place where convictedness has found its home."

On Thursday night Dr. Mouw and Rev. Dr. Cruz will be joined by Ruth Fox. International Ministries Global Coordinator for Education; and Dr. Kathy Moore, a leader in the Creation Justice Network. They will offer live-stream workshops focusing on their area of expertise in light of our theme on Civility.




Community Service and how these ministries have all been affected by the Covid 19 pandemic.
