To Your Health



Gardasil is a vaccine which provides immunity from two types of human papillomavirus, or HPV. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices recently recommended it routinely be given to pre-teen girls and is now expanding that recommendation to include pre-teen boys. Even though the initial recommendation ignited a political maelstrom, the dangers of HPV-induced cancers are real and life-threatening.

Although HPV rarely causes symptoms, it is the most common sexually transmitted infection in the United States with more than 6 million new infections each year. And the on-going research indicates that males are susceptible to contracting cancers as well as females.

The Parsonage

We had a lengthy discussion at our October Church Council about the disposition of our parsonage. Of the four options proposed by our Board of Trustees, the Council voted to narrow the choices to these two:

- 1. Retain and maintain in vacancy
- 2. Sell to the fire company, which would demolish the house, pave a portion, and the land between the church and the north wall of the parsonage would be retained by the church.

A two-page description prepared by Marcus Rotundo provides more detail. We are asking all who can to pick up a copy at the table leading into our sanctuary and sign the vellow tablet. We will mail to all members who have not done so.

An initial congregation-wide discussion of these two proposals will be held on Sunday, November 13th as we finish our carry-in meal following our time of worship.

Organ Donation

No, this is not about a musical instrument. This is about every-day people – people like you and me. Except that these people are living with a short lease on life.

Currently there are over 111,000 individuals on organ transplant wait lists in the U.S. Approximately 10% are in New York State. However, due to the shortage of organ donors - 18 people a day died in 2010 while awaiting an organ transplant.

National Donor Sabbath is part of an organ donation initiative launched by the US Department of Health and Human Services in 1997. From Friday November 11th through Sunday the 13th, faith communities across the Nation focus on the critical need for organs, eye and tissue donation and its life-saving capabilities.

Text4baby

Despite decades of public health outreach and education, more than 500,000 babies are born prematurely and an estimated 28,000 children die before their first birthday each year in the U.S. Many factors cause these negative outcomes, including health care access, poverty, and negative health behaviors.

To help more pregnant women and new moms get information about caring for their health and giving their babies the best possible start in life, a broad public/private partnership, including government, private and nonprofit partners has launched *Text4Baby*, a free texting service that provides health tips and reminders to support healthy pregnancies and babies.

Registration is easy and can be done online at text4baby.org or from your cell phone by texting the word BABY (or BEBE for Spanish) to the number 511411. You'll be asked to enter your baby's due date or your baby's birthday and your zip code. Once registered, you will start receiving **free** messages with tips for your pregnancy or caring for your baby.

Messages are timed to your due date or your baby's birth date. If you are pregnant and your due date changes, text UPDATE to 511411 to enter your new due date. Once you have your baby, be sure to text in UPDATE with your baby's birthday so you keep getting messages through baby's first year. To stop receiving messages, text STOP to 511411.

"OFF" SWITCHES

Everything that uses electricity causes the meter to run when the switches are left in the "on" position. This is perfectly fine when the items are being used. But often people forget.

Frequently lights are left on, the copier in the office is left on, and the exhaust fans in our rest rooms are left running. Please try to remember to use the "off" switch on these and any other power-consuming item when you are finished using them (except the refrigerator, of course).

This will allow our Trustees to use more of the gifts we receive in ways that further our works of ministry instead of sending them to National Grid.

Baptist Sexuality Conference

The elephant in the room is sexualtiy. For more reasons than can be fit in this newsletter, we – like most congregations – choose to not discuss the issue until it's right in our face. The problem with that, as you well know, is that discussion never takes place. Eruptions of emotional outbursts do. And, of course, the Bible is used as a hiding place, as a weapon, as a justification, etc., for whatever position a person might take.

Usually, though, the Bible is consulted to affirm an opinion. Although that may not change, the best time to discuss such issues is when they are not thrust upon us and can conveniently be ignored. And the Baptist Conference on Sexuality and Covenant is designed to be a forum for those discussions.
